by the old Lines run by Thomas Armor in 1754 as may be seen in his Field Notes signed by John Forsyth
 (a Copy) 8th August 1785) and find them as here laid down; they are fairly marked

all around & on which the adjoining Surveys have ^{been} made — A Line appears likewise marked from
 a Black Oak represented by N^o 1 to a B:OK N^o 2; each of said Trees are marked with 6 Notches which
 I take to be the same Line mentioned in — Sawbels Deposition — The Land was surveyed by Thomas
 Armor in pursuance of Two Warrants, each for 100^a ^{one} Dated the 28th day of March 1763 to ~~Christian Wampler~~
 the other dated ~~20th March 1775~~ 10th Sept^r 1750 to Peter Gakler — in Right of Christian Wampler Father
 of John Wampler who is now in possession Thomas Armor made a Mistake in his Field Notes which
 I suppose was the Reason he did not make the Return, as it appears he was paid his Fees & Ten
 shillings over for Extra Service - but did not Return while in Commission to Rectify his Error (which
 appears a peculiar hardship that by a Deputy Surveyor neglecting his Duty the Land holder is
 obliged to pay twice for that Service — In such Case I think (unless Death or some unavoidable accident)
 the Fees paid ought to be recoverable out of the Estate of the Delinquent) — Conrad Sherman
 has taken a Warrant Dated May 20th 1785 for 100^a by Virtue of which he Claims the part Westward of the Dotted
 Line between the two Black Oaks mentioned & laid down on the Draught as likewise the Vacant Land adjoining
 that & his other Land as represented above The Parties Refer the Decision to the Board of Property, as all
 the means in my Power has proved abortive as to settling matters on the Spot & which is the first Case I
 have met with wherein I have failed in Obtaining so salutary an end —
