



A Draft of a tract of land situate on the South West Branch of the Frankstown Branch of Juniata in Greenfield township Bedford County. Containing Three hundred and ninety & one half acres and allowance of six percent for Roads & so. Surveyed for Matthew Potter the 27th day of March 1767 on Order No. 1369 dated the 26th day of September 1766. No. 1 represented by the dotted lines is a draft of a tract of land surveyed for Christian Snyder on warrant dated the 1st day of June 1763. This tract interferes Three Hundred and thirty seven & one half acres with the Matthew Potter Survey. Christian Snyder conveyed to Daniel Clark & Dr. William Smith. Daniel Clark conveyed to the firms of Milford & Roberts and Neat & Pegew. Neat and Pegew conveyed their interest to William Neate who devised the same to his heirs the present owners. he appointed Frederick Pegew, ^{his Ex^r} who appointed Wm. Henry Pegew, Henry Harford & Robert Lambert his Executors who appointed Thomas C. James of New York their agent who appointed Thomas Stewartson of Philadelphia his agent. the firm of Milford & Roberts devised their interest to their heirs and appointed William Masterman their Executor who appointed Thomas C. James his agent who appointed Thomas Stewartson his agent. Dr. William Smith devised his undivided half to his heirs and appointed Charles Smith & Benjamin R. Morgan his Executors who appointed William R. Smith of Bedford County their agent. No. 2 represented partly by latte coulered lines is a draft of a tract of land surveyed for Charles Pettit on warrant dated the 3th day of June 1763. This tract interfere twelve acres and fifty three perches with the Matthew Potter survey. The decent and conveyances of Charles Pettit tract in all respects the same as Christian Snyder tract as described above.
