The purple lines represent the draught of a tract of land surveyed for Isaac Bartram on order No. 1735 dated the 29th day of October 1766. This tract interferes two hundred and seventy five acres and twenty perches with the Robert Quigley survey. Isaac Bartram conveyed to William Trent who conveyed to Alexander Stewart who conveyed to Henry Stewart the present owner.

The same purple lines represent the draught of a tract of land surveyed for James Young on Order No. 525 dated the 1st day of August 1766. This tract interferes two hundred and seventy five acres and twenty perches with the Robt Quigley survey. James Young conveyed to Matthew Hand who conveyed to Duncan Stewart who conveyed to Duncan McIntosh, who abandoned his claim to this land. No. 1. represented by dotted lines is part of a draught of a tract of land surveyed for Daniel Grant on Warrant dated the 29th November 1762. This tract interferes twenty acres and sixty eight perches with the Robt Quigley survey. Daniel Grant conveyed to John Little, John Lutrens and Geo. Woods. John Little and John Lutrens conveyed to George Woods whose heirs conveyed to Thomas More the present owner. No. 2. represented by dotted lines is part of the Draught of a survey made for John Bartlet on Warrant dated 20th September 1762. This tract interferes sixty seven acres and one hundred and fifty perches with the Robt Quigley survey. John Bartlet conveyed to John Little, John Lutrens and George Woods. John Little & John Lutrens conveyed to George Woods whose heirs conveyed to Thomas More the present owner.
