 No. 1 represented by dotted lines is part of a survey made for James Hagerly by virtue of an Improvemt commenced in 1774. This interferes five & one half acres, with the William McCord survey. James Hagerly conveyed to John Masters who conveyed to Richard Masters, who conveyed to David Bundle Esqr. the present owner. No. 2 is part of a survey made for John Haines on Warrant dated the 17th day of September 1787. This tract interferes twenty four acres and nineteen perches with the William McCord survey. John Haines conveyed to Joseph Leidig whose widow and heirs now own the land. No. 3 is part of a survey made for John Haines by virtue of a settlement commenced in the year 1798. This tract interferes seven acres and seventeen perches with the William McCord survey. John Haines conveyed to Joseph Leidig whose widow and heirs are the present owners. Part of a settlement made by George Pickett in the year 1788. Interferes with the William McCord survey. George Pickett conveyed to Alexander Rhearn who conveyed to Eli Leidig from whom it was sold by the Sheriff of Bedford County to Cornelious Devore the present owner. No survey has been made on said Improvemt. N.B. Henry Shertee claims fifty acres of William McCord survey by virtue of an Improvemt commenced by Jesse Masters in 1778. Jesse Masters conveyed to John Haines who conveyed to Henry Haines the present who conveyed to John A. Ramsey who conveyed to Henry Shertee the present owner.
