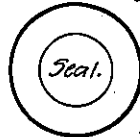

~~Recd~~ In order to a full Settlement and Confirmation of a certain Tract of land laid out on Skuykill to the Family of the Swansons for six hundred acres (in exchange for 300 acres by them surrendered to the Prop<sup>r</sup>) where the city Philad<sup>ia</sup> now stands.) Granted by the said Swansons to & now in the possession of John Hoods John Gallow and Mours Justason: These are to require you the Surveyors of this County of Philad<sup>ia</sup> forthwith together to resurvey the s<sup>d</sup> whole Tract and to lay out as near as conveniently may be according to the old lines of Survey and division to the s<sup>d</sup> John Hoods 200 acres to J<sup>r</sup> Gallow 200 acres and to Mours Justason 200 Acres being the whole of the s<sup>d</sup> Tract and make returns upon a full Agreement of the parties under both your hands into the Gen<sup>l</sup> Surveyors office at Philad<sup>ia</sup> where this warr<sup>t</sup> is to remain and a copy thereof to be deliv<sup>d</sup> to you certified by the Secretary. Given under our hands and the Seal of the Province at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the 4<sup>th</sup> of ye 3<sup>d</sup> mo<sup>th</sup> 1702.
