In pursuance of a warrant to me directed bearing date the 14<sup>th</sup> day of November 1741 for surveying for the Use and Behoof of the Honourable the Proprietaries the Tenth Part of all such lands as shall be surveyed within the said Province I caused to be surveyed on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of September 1742 a tract of land situate near Conowingo on the West side of Susquehanna River in the County of Lancaster. Beginning at a marked White oak, and from thence extending by Daniel Slegle's land south sixty seven degrees east One hundred and sixty four perches to a marked white oak, Thence by Samuel Robinson's land south twenty three degrees east seventy perches to a marked white oak, and south sixty seven degrees west sixty two perches to a marked White oak, Thence by vacant land the three courses and distances next following Viz: south (obl.) three degrees (obl.) three hundred and eighteen perches to a marked white oak, North sixty seven degrees east two hundred and twenty six perches to a post, and north twenty three degrees west Three hundred and eighty eight perches to the Place of Beginning Containing Four hundred and ninety one acres and the usual allowance of six Acres & Ct for roads &c<sup>a</sup> Returned into the Secretarys office the — day of — Anno Domi 1746.
