



Benja: Fairman says that his father settled & completed the ^{Survey of 1714} Manors of Perkasie the last Journey he made in the Woods (w^{ch} was in 1714. as I take it)

Jerem: Langhorne says that he wth Jno: Cutler attended T. Fairman (about y^e year 1712) for about a week he pretending to shew them y^e Lines of Perkasie Manors but that he shew'd none but a N.E. Line from y^e Indian fields about Bernard Yourgs

That he also discoursing wth a man w^{ch} is now living ^{that was} then Expected to be appointed Surveyor of Bucks County T.F. said they must necessarily have some understanding together, for he had made several Surveys in Bucks that no other but himself knew of & particularly he had run one Line ^{only} for a Manors w^{ch} he could move or order according as Conviency suited when he Completed that Survey. & I hear That Allen Forster & several others were present with T. Fairman at Perkasie in 1714 at w^{ch} time they run a new Line for the Manors to meet Hudsons Line but Settled no Corner near the North Branch 6th 9th 1733 Upon Jer: Lang: repetition of y^e most of this at Philad: he asked me why we so much insisted on T. Fair- Report of his having Survey'd y^e Manors before y^e Date of y^e Patent Reflecting on him as having encroacht on the Manors To w^{ch} I answered that I questioned whether T. Fairman had Completed the Survey at that time of y^e date afores^d.

afterw^{ch} in y^e same Month it was agreed that y^e Manors as lately run by Jno: Chapman be Divid^d into 4. Eq. P^{ts}
