



Pursuant to an order of the Board of Property and of Samuel Cockron Esq<sup>r</sup> Surveyor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania dated April 27<sup>th</sup> 1803 To me the Deputy Surveyor of Delaware County directed for a resurvey of a Tract of land lying in Middleton township in the county of Delaware aforesaid (late Chester) containing 450 Acres as surveyed December 9<sup>th</sup> 1682 by Charles Ashcom for Thomas Taylor. And having resurveyed the same do make a return thereof as follows - Beginning at the waters edge of Upland now Chester creek in land now of Jonathan Tyson and running fifty degrees East six perches to an ancient marked white oak tree an original corner (of Richard Crosby's land) which tree has always been acknowledged, thence continuing the same course seven hundred and thirty two perches to an ancient marked white oak tree within four perches of Preston now Ridley creek (which is the original named and marked corner tree) thence continuing the same course four perches to waters edge of Preston now Ridley creek. thence up the same creek North seven degrees East eight perches. thence north Twenty eight degrees East ten perches. thence North sixteen degrees West five perches. thence North forty nine degrees West thirty perches. thence North twelve degrees East twenty three and a half perches. thence north Twenty six and a half degrees West five and half perches thence North sixty five degrees West to John Lungren's land. Thence by the said Lungren's land South fifty degrees West two perches to opposite a Chestnut Oak Tree which I marked as a line tree tho' standing one foot south of the true line. Thence continuing the same course seven hundred and thirty two perches to an ancient marked Walnut Tree as a corner near Upland now Chester Creek (which is acknowledged as such) thence on the same course three perches and three tenths to waters edge of Upland now Chester Creek. Thence down the same Creek South sixty nine and half degrees East eleven perches. thence South forty and a half degrees East forty nine perches. thence South eight perches. thence South twenty two and a half degrees ~~East eleven perches~~ West twenty nine perches. thence South thirty three degrees East six perches. thence South Sixty six degrees East forty three perches to the place of beginning. Containing the hundred and seventy five Acres and one hundred & thirty one perches. And between the strait lines and the line of marked trees there is seven Acres and forty three Perches. Total 583 Acres 34 Perches - Resurvey between June 9<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> 1803.

Note - in running the lines from Creek to Creek by poles I find a variation of the needle of seven and an half degrees on each line (from  $46^{\circ} 10' 54''$ ) in running from Upland now Chester creek I find the ancient marked White oak Tree as a corner six perches from said creek. And at one hundred and eighty four perches, stands a white oak tree anciently marked as a line tree one perch south of the strait line (as run). At six hundred and thirty four perches from said Chester Creek stands another white oak tree anciently marked as a line tree, one perch and seven tenths of a Perch South of the strait line (as run). Which tree was blocked four years ago and counted ninety five growths making the date from the last survey previous thereto, to the satisfaction of the surveyors then present & the parties concerned as they all informed me while on the ground. And at one hundred and three perches & four tenths from the last mentioned white oak tree and four perches from Preston now Ridley creek stands in the strait line the ancient marked white oak tree as a corner. This being the contested corner I had it blocked and found that it counted one hundred growths since it was marked. Then had it blocked further and found another set of marks which counted nineteen growths to the remarking, making the full time to the original survey - In running the North line from Preston now Ridley Creek at two perches from said creek I marked a Chestnut Oak Tree (by consent of the parties, the ancient corner Chestnut being gone) one foot south of the strait line. And at three & an half perches from said creek marked another Chestnut oak tree one foot North of line. And at twenty perches from said Creek is a doubled marked white oak lying down an ancient line tree. And one hundred & twenty eight perches & three tenths stands a line Gum tree anciently marked (the only singly) from said Preston now Ridley creek. And at one hundred and sixty one perches & two tenths from said creek & four hundred and seventy six perches & three tenths from Upland now Chester Creek stands an ancient marked Black-oak tree one perch and a quarter north of strait line (as run). This tree I had also blocked and found it doubly marked and to count to the same year and in the same manner as the (contested) corner white oak tree at Ridley creek on the south line. And at three perches and three tenths from Chester creek stands the ancient marked Walnut tree as a corner (and disputed by none as I've heard). I have calculated the survey by the strait lines by the Table - The rest by the scale &c. - I have remarked all the ancient marked Trees (that is living) along the lines notwithstanding the strait lines did not touch all of them. I have not marked any others except two Chestnut oak for the North corner at Ridley creek.
