



By Virtue of an Order of the Board of Property Dated 15th December 1801 Resurveyed the above tract Jan^y 7th 1802 and by including the part adjoining Martin Treaster it is found to contain Three hundred and fifty three acres and 107 perches of Land & allowance. But the course from the Black Oak to the intersection ~~course~~ corresponds both with Martin Treaster and Peter Fishers survey which renders it probable there can be no Vacancy. But on the other hand Martin Treaster has his whole distance on the line South 82 1/2 W. to the Marked Pine and it is said claims no further perhaps this may be ~~open~~ owing to Ignorance, if that piece is considered as Vacant it contains ten acres and 27 perches of Land & alle - all of which is respectfully submitted.
