



In pursuance of an Order dated the twenty second day of January 1767 No 2527 Surveyed
 the twenty fifth day of August 1767 for Jeremiah Warden of the City of Philadelphia a
 certain tract of land situate on the Raystown branch of Juniper in the County of
 Cumberland Beginning at a marked pine tree on the bank of the said branch thence by vaca-
 mt land south twenty six degrees East one hundred and sixteen perches to a marked
 white oak south forty seven degrees West one hundred and twenty perches to a marked white oak
 and south forty degrees East forty one perches to a post thence by Land of James Maxwell Esq.
 South seventy one degrees East eighty one perches to a marked white oak thence by Buffalo
 Ridge North thirty seven degrees East two hundred and Eighty four perches to a marked hickory
 on the side of the said Raystown branch of Juniper thence up the same on the several
 courses thereof two hundred and Ninety five perches to the place of beginning containing
 Two hundred and thirty three acres and the usual allowance of six acres p. C. for
 Roads &c.
