



By Virtue of a Warrant from the Proprietaries dated the second day of November 1734 Surveyed unto Daniel Le Bar a tract of land Situate in Newcowissichoppin in the County of Philad<sup>a</sup>. Beginning at a post in a line of the German tract thence by other land of s<sup>d</sup> Le Bar South East one hundred and Sixty Eight perches to a post thence by Vacant land North East fifty perches and a half perch to a White Oak thence by vac<sup>t</sup> land North West one hundred and Sixty Eight perches to a post in a line of s<sup>d</sup> German Tract thence by the same South West fifty perches and a half perch to ye place of Beginning Containing fifty acres with the usual allowance of Six <sup>th</sup> Cent. Surveyed Novemb<sup>r</sup> 22<sup>d</sup> 1734

Now granted to his son Philip Lebar by Warr<sup>t</sup> dated ye 27<sup>th</sup> of June 1740 of the right of the adjoin<sup>g</sup> 150<sup>ac</sup> being also vested in the said Philip Le Bar both Returned together ye 28<sup>th</sup> of June 1740.
