



By Virtue of a Warrant from the Proprietor Dated the 4th Day of the 5th m^o Anno Dom. 1734. The Above Described Tract of Land was Surveyed Unto Samuel Mitchel, in the Township of Salisbury, in the Countey of Lancaster. Begining at a Black Oak at a Corner of Alexander M^c Cammont's Land, Thence North 74 Degrees West by an Improvement of y^e Said Alexander 86 perches to a Black Oak. Thence North 4 Degrees West by the Improvement of Samuel Buchanan 44 perches to a Black Oak, Thence North 4 Degrees East by the Same 136 perches to a Hickery, Thence N. 63^d East by William Willson 74 perches to a post. Thence South 60 Degrees East by the Same 100 perches, to a post. Thence East by North by James Gaat 120 perches to a Black Oak. Thence South West on the Line of Hugh M^c Lellan 60 perches to a White Oak. Thence South 30 Degrees West 12 perches to a Hickery, Thence Down a Run on Several Courses 100 p. to a Black Oak. Thence South 65 Degrees East 7 perches to a Hickery. Thence South West on a line of Alexander M^c Cammont 150 perches to a Black Oak. Thence North West by the Same 60 perches to the place of Begining. Containing Two Hundred & Seventy Five acres beside the Allowance of Six $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent.
