



By Virtue of an Order ~~from Richard Peters's Survey~~ to me Directed, bearing Date April 2 1742. Surveyd to David Mitchel on the 11th day of y^e 2nd Month Anno Do- miny 1744, a Tract of Land Scituate on y^e East Side of Susquehanna River, in the Township of Drummore in Lancaster County, beginning at a black Oak Corner Stand- ing in a Line of Oharrow's Land, thence W. S. W. by Vacant Land 200 P. to a Chesnut, thence S. W. 100 P. to a hickery, thence S. by E. 100 P. to a Chesnut Oak. Thence N. 74° E. 95 Perches to a black Oak, Thence N. E. by N. 140 Perches to a hickery. Thence E. S. E. 22 Perches to a black Oak. Thence N. E. 145 Perches, to a Post, standing in a Line of 5^d Charles Oharrow's Land. Thence by y^e said Land N. W. 101 Perches, to the place of beginning. Containing 212 Acres $\frac{1}{2}$ & y^e allowance of 6 Acres p^r Cent for Roads &c.
