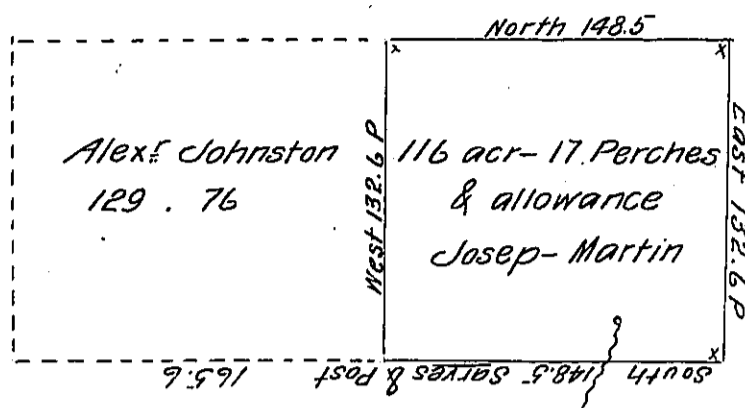

I John Martin Deputy Surveyor in and for the County of Beaver have May 30<sup>th</sup> 1836. ~~surveyed and~~ applied a warrant granted by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to Joseph Martin of South Beaver Township in the County of Beaver adjoining land of Samuel McClain on the East, Alex: Johnston on the South, Thomas McCoy on the West and John Martin, Assignee of James Alexander on the North, for one hundred and fifteen acres, dated May 17<sup>th</sup> 1836. Which land I Surveyed January 16<sup>th</sup> 1836 for the said Joseph Martin including the Improvent ~~and~~ and a remaining part of a Survey made for Robert Willson Dec<sup>d</sup> by Hugh McCullough ~~for~~ Deputy Surveyor in and for the County of Beaver and entered in the Survey Book. viz on the actual Settlement of said Robert Willson Dec<sup>d</sup> dated <sup>October</sup> 13<sup>th</sup> 1815 the above draft of 116 acres 17 perches being the remaining part of said Survey represented by the black lines, and not Claimed by any Warrant nor none have been granted for the same by this Commonwealth or other right that can be seen by the Survey Book, other than to the said Joseph Martin and the dotted lines represent the part included in an earlier Survey of Said A. Johnston including 129 acres 76 perches & allowance of six P<sup>c</sup> Ct the same being transfered to the said Joseph Martin. viz. the 116 acres 17 perches as appears by Documents attached to the application for the Warrant A correct Copy from the Book of Surveys in my office the 30<sup>th</sup> day of May 1836+ by me.
