



Situate in Warrior Mark Township Huntingdon County. The black lines in the above diagram represent a survey which was made in pursuance of a Warrant granted to John Baynton and Samuel Wharton dated the 28th day of July 1766. The two Surveys in the above diagram inclosed with lines edged with green were made the 29th & 30th days of October, 1766, in pursuance of two Orders of Surveys, one of them Granted to William Porter & the other of them to ^{Nathaniel} ~~Richard~~ Johns dated respectively the 1st of August 1766. Both of which rights have succeeded against the rights of John Baynton & Samuel Wharton by a due Course of Law had in our Courts. The piece of John Baynton & Samuel Wharton Survey marked with the letter **B** contains three hundred twenty one Acres 130 perches. And is all that is now left of the survey of John Baynton & Samuel Wharton, which is not included in older surveys & better titles. The above diagram made from an actual Survey on the ground the 22nd day of March 1828, & re-examined & found correct the 9th day of April, 1833. In pursuance of an order of resurvey from the Board of property of this Commonwealth dated the 1st of Feby. 1828, the original survey of John Baynton & Samuel Wharton was said to contain 608 Acres & Allowance.
