All which may be Plainly & intelligibly answerd in a fewwords; It is truethe Land might be Termed Vacant when she Settled (or rather was settled) on it, because there never had been any warrant obtained for it, but according to the best Intelligence I could get of it (& which I believe to be true) her Uncle Robert Cather the former Possessor of that Place (now Purchased by James Caldwell) Settled her thereon, it being one Corner of his Plantation or the Land Claimed by him; and made an Agreement wther that she should Live there Undis turbed for a certain Time set, which Time I Understood to be three Years (or somewhat to this Purpose) and accordingly when her said Ucle went away he sold his Place together with that Part of it at a Publick Vendue; it passed on so for some Time, I believe several years, Till Somebody I suppose put it in this Womans head to get a Warrant perswading her that not with standing her 5d Bargain with her uncle she might hold the Land thereby, which for ought I care she may as long as her miserable Life Endures; For when I Survey'd the Land, I advised her to sell her warrant to Jas Caldwell so that she might not be a Loser by it and told her if she was Contented with that, That I would Return it as Land in Dispute But that I could not in Justice lay her 25 9 out believing the State of the Case to be as afore said; her Improvement is not much more than half an Acre; & where to find ye half of 259 clear of James Caldwell's apparent Right & other Disputes I know not - Now whether her Representa-George Churchman. tion of her case be Genuine, Judge Ye.
