It will be seen by the dates set down on the above drafts that the land was previously surveyed and appropriated. According to the last information I could get the ~~was~~ ^{Location} ~~has~~ been laid on the land called for. The only limestone spring I could find within half a mile of the mouth of Magees run is the one contained in the Survey of William Beard which is about half a mile above the mouth of the run. I would have had some doubts about the application of this Location had it not been that Judge Campbell who was one of the first settlers in this Country, informed that the above tracts of land were in contention for some time after the Revolutionary war by Culbertson that it was either given up by Culbertson or decided in favor of the above titles. The survey of Culbertson as above described includes the improvt. of Saml. Moorhead who holds under the title to Freeman and the heirs of Thos. N. Sloan. Decd. are in possession of the tract in the name of William Beard.
