

By Virtue of a Warrant from the Commiss<sup>rs</sup> of Property bearing date the 20<sup>th</sup> day of the 3<sup>d</sup> month 1703 for Resurveying Lands in the County of Chester there was Resurvey'd unto Robert Chamberlain a Tract of Land in the said County (part in the Township of Concord bought of Tho. King & part in the Township of Aston bought of Charles Brooks) beginning at an Ash tree by Chester Creek in Aston township and Running from thence south Sixty Six degrees West by Joseph Bakers land two hundred and forty four Pches. to a Hickery tree in the Line dividing Concord and Aston Then in the said line South twenty four degrees east fifty perches to a black oak Thence into Concord Township South Sixty Six degrees west two hundred thirty three perches by Nathaniel Newlins land to a corner stone thence south twenty four degrees east by Thomas Kings land seventy three Pches. to a Post. Thence North Sixty Six degr. east by Moses Keys land two hundred and thirty ~~thirty~~ <sup>division</sup> three perches to a white oak Thence south twenty four degrees east in the aforesd. ~~division~~ line nineteen Pches to a Black oak Thence North twenty degrees east seventy seven perches to a white oak Thence north Sixty six degrees east fifty four perches to a marked tree Thence North twenty degrees east Sixty three perches to a hickery tree Thence South fifty degrees east fifty one Perches to a Post thence North Sixty six degrees east one hundred and five perches to a hickery tree by Chester Creek. The five lines last mentioned running by Thomas Woodwards land then up the said Creek on several Courses one hundred Pches to the Beginning Containing two hundred and fifty one acres. Resurvey'd the 12<sup>th</sup> of the fourth month 1703.
