

Whereas we Humphrey Morrey & John Budd Purchase of William Bacon of Inner Temple Gent five Thousand Acres of Land his first purchase in the province of Pensylvania. And having had Surveys made in Right there of as well as made sundry sales to others to the full quantity of the said whole purchase of five Thousand Acres aforesaid. in some of which surveys amendments, alterations and abatements of the Quantities have been by which change and alterations so made we Judge the quantity Lying as surveyed to us to be Exact to Compleate the same. but the Difficulty of Accertaining the thing at this time to be so Leaves about fifty Acres not fully desided and by the present Accots in the office seems to be over and above sd Quantity. now in Case that on a further settlement we Cannot cleare up that matter to the heirs of the late proprietary or his Surveyor Genl we here by oblige ourselves to pay for or Convey a Right to such a Quantity of Land so in suspence as aforesaid witnessse our hand this 14<sup>th</sup> Aug<sup>t</sup> 1728.
