

By vertue of a warrant from the governor dated the 19th 2 mo last directed to mee to survey unto Lawrence & Joseph Growdon five thousand acres upon Neshaminteh Creek if conveniently can bee, and wheareas the governor by his warrant of the 25th. of 11 mo ord. ten thousand acres to bee ~~layd~~^{surveyd} to Nicholas Moore presd. in some fit and convenient place, and hee desiring to have 5000 acres upon the sayd creek and both pitching in one place of the creeke, I repayred to the governor and shewed him both their warrants and hee ordred that I should first sett out to Lawrence and Joseph Growdon, now to the end that I may accomodate them both as neere as possibell, I heare by authorities ^{survey &} thee, to set out to the sayd Lawrance and Joseph Growdon the sayd quantity betwixt his Land upon dullawar rivver and the creeke pret que-ssink [leving the hundred acres to John Gilbert wheare hee is settled] and to try if the quantity may bee had their without going to neshaminteh creek for any of it and heareof make mee returne before thou medell wth any on neshaminteh Creek and then thou shalt have farther order from mee philadelfia
