



Pursuant to a warrant from the proprietors Commissioners of property bearing date ye 28th of ye 2^d mo. 1702. directed unto me I hereby certify that I have resurveyed the 8th of ye 4th mo. ensuing unto Roger Hughs a certain lot in Philadelphia bounded on the East with David Lloyds lot being formerly Edward Lutts, and on the south with back lots and the west with David Merediths lot and one ye north with Chestnut street being in breadth 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ foot, another lot for David Meredith bounded on the east with the said Roger Hughs and on the south with back lots and one — west with Richard Cooks lot and on the north with Chestnut street being in breadth 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ foot, and another lot for Richard Cooke bounded one ye east with David Merediths lot and on the south with back lots and one the west with John Lloyds lot and one the north with Chestnut street being in breadth 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ foot, and another lot for John Lloyd bounded one ye east with Richard Cooke's lot and one the south with back lots & one the west with David Prie lot & one the north with Chestnut street being in breadth 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ foot, and another lot for David Prie bounded one the east with John Lloyds lot and one ye south with back lots and one the west with the fifth street from Delaware — and one the north with Chestnut street being in breadth 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ foot, the said five lots being each in length but 249 foot as appears from Chestnut street to ye back lots but according to regulation as other lots are by putters these ought to be 256 foot in length.
