At the request of John Morris that we would grant him to take up a fourth five hundred acres of land part of two thousand five hundred acres by him bought of Thomas ffairman who purchased of Thomas Harley his right to five thousand acres originally purchased of the Prop<sup>rs</sup>.

These are to require thee forthwith to survey or cause to be survey'd to the sd John Morris according to the method of townships the sd number of five hundred acres of land that has not been already survey'd nor taken up nor is concealed nor seated by ye Indians to be seated by the sd John Morris or his assigns within two years after the date of survey otherwise the sd survey to be void and of no other effect than if the same had never been made and make returns thereof into ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> Secretaries office.

Given under our hands & ye seal of the Province at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the 8<sup>th</sup> day of x<sup>br</sup> 1701.
