

By virtue of a warrant from the Commissioners of Property dated the 3^d day of May Anno — 1716, requireing me to survey unto Francis Worley of the County of Chester one thousand acres of land in the said County. This may certifie that on the 18th day of May in the year 1717 there was survey'd and set out for the said Francis Worley in part of the said thousand acres a tract of land on Pequea Creek in the said County of Chester beginning at a white walnut tree by the side of the said Creek at a corner of David Jones' land and running by the same land west north west two hundred sixty six perches to a ^{hickry} tree then west south west by another line of the said David Jones' land sixty seven perches to another hickery tree thence north west one hundred and eighteen perches to a corner tree ^{then S.W. nineteen perches to a post} then north west one hundred forty eight perches to a white oak then west north west one hundred & eighty perches to a spanish oak then north east by north one hundred and sixteen perches to a black oak then east south east two hundred & twenty perches to a black oak then south east by east two hundred and sixty perch^s to a black oak then east by south seventy perches to a hickery tree then east north east thirty four perches to a white oak by the side of the said Creek then down the same on the several water courses thereof about two hundred & thirty perches to the place of beginning containing five hundred acres with allowance of six per cent.
