The Second Lot

Begins at a post being the meeting of the Corn^r of Ratliff Street & Market Street, Thence up Ratliff Street 13 p^{rs} and 1/2, Thence by said Peter Websters Land 13 p^{rs} and 1/2, Thence by Cedar Street 13 p^{rs} and 1/2 to a Corner of Market Street, Thence by Market Street 13 p^{rs} and 1/2 to the Corner at Ratliff Street being the place of Beginning in this Lot.

The Third Lot

Begins at a post being the Meeting of Wood Street und Market Street, thence by Market Street Side 18 p^{rs} and 1/2 to Phineas Pemberton's Lot, thence by the Same 13 p^{rs} and 1/2 to a post by said Peter Webster's Land, Then by the Same 18 p^{rs} and 1/2 to a post in Wood Street, Thence by the Said Street 13 p^{rs} and 1/2 to the place of beginning in This Lot
