

In Pursuance of a Warrant from the Commiss^s. of Property dated the first day of the 3^d Month Anno 1719 for five hundred acres of Land to be laid out for Henry Panibaker of Skepeck in the County of Philadelphia, This may Certifie that there was Surveyd and set out for the Said Henry in Part of the Said 500 acres a Tract or Parcel of Land near a Branch of Perkeoming in the Said County, Beginning at a Corner Post of Christian Miers Land, Thence by the Same North East two hundred and forty perches to a sappling in a Line of of James Steels land, Then by the Same South East two hundred and six perches ~~to a post~~ to a post, Then South West by Vacant Land & the Land of Konrade Kuster One hundred forty one perches to a post, Then South East by the Said Kusters land thirty seven perches to a hickry, Thence by Clause Johnson's land South West Ninety nine perches to a post, Then North West two hundred forty three perches to the place of Beginning Containing three hundred and fourteen acres with allowance of six per cent, Surveyd the 20th of February 1725
 Also another Tract of Land near a branch of Perkeoming in the County aforesaid Beginning at a Spanish Oak Sapling near a Corner of James Shatticks land, Thence by the Same South West two hundred eighty eight perches to a post at a Corner of John Budds Land Thence South East by the Said Budds Land One hundred & Eighty perches to a Spanish Oak marked for a Corner, Then by Land of John Budd and other Land North East two hundred eighty eight perches to a post, Then North West by vacant Land one hundred and eighty perches to the place of Beginning Containing three hundred and eight acres with allowance of six per cent.
 Surveyd the first day of March 1725.
 The Surplusage of both these Tracts above the Warrant is 12.6 acres
