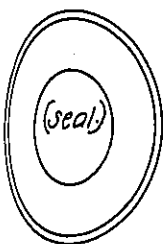


Pennsylvania ss:



By the Commissioners of Property.

Whereas the Proprietary soon after he had first obtained the Grant of this Province from the Govern^r, did Grant unto William Plumstead of London and to his Children One thousand Acres of Land to be taken up in this Province after the same manner and to be held upon the same terms with other Lands purchased within ye same. These therefore are at the Request of Clement Plumstead Son and Sarah Hall Daughter of the sd William Plumstead to Authorize and require thee to Survey and lay out to the said Clement and Sarah being the only children of the said William that ever came into ~~these parts~~ ^{sd. Province} the said quantity of one thousand Acres of Land (according to the method of Townships appointed) that has not been already survey'd nor taken up nor is concealed nor seated by the Indians, and make Returns thereof into the Secretaries Office. Given under our hands and Seal of the Province at Philadelphia the 23^d day of the 6th moth 1707.
