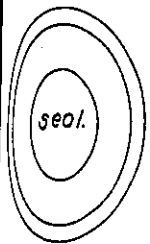

William Penn Absolute Proprietary & Govern<sup>r</sup>  
in Chief of the Province of Pensilvania & Counties Annexed  
At the Request of Christopher Pennock Attorney for Thomas Phips

That I would grant him to take up five Hundred Acres of land in Right of  
his s<sup>d</sup> constituent old Purchaser of one Thousand Acres, These are to Re-  
quire thee forth with to Survey or cause to be Survey'd unto him the said Num-  
ber of acres of Land not yet taken up, nor Concealed, nor cleared by the  
Indians, to be laid out according to the Method of Townships by me appoint-  
ed, He taking out a patent for ye same within three Months after thou  
shalt make Returns thereof into my Secretaries Office which thou art  
hereby required to doe with all convenient Speed Given under my Hand  
and Seal at Pensburg the 2<sup>d</sup> day of the 7<sup>th</sup> mo<sup>th</sup> 1700.

To Edward Penington Surveyor Gen<sup>l</sup>, Wm. Penn.  
of the Province of Pensilv<sup>ia</sup> and Territories.
