

Pennsylvania ss.

By virtue of a General Warrant dated the thirty first day of December 1733 there was surveyed on the eleventh day of April 1739 to the use of the Honourable the Proprietaries a certain Tract of land Situate on the north east side of Susquahanna River in Donegal Township in the County of Lancaster Beginning at a marked Water Beech standing on the Bank of the said River and from thence extending by George Miranda's land north fifty four Deg^s and a half east one hundred and forty two perches to a post thence by John Galbreath Jun^r's land north thirty one degrees West Two hundred and fourteen perches to a post thence by James Logan's land west south west one hundred and fourteen perches to a post standing on the said Susquahanna River thence down the same on the several courses thereof two Hundred and forty seven perches to the Place of Beginning Containing Two hundred and three acres and the usual allowance of six acres & Cent for roads &c. Returned into the Secretarys office the seventh day of January Anno Domini 1755.

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this sixteenth day of March 1910.
