Where as there is a certain narrow slip of Land lying between the  
Plantation of Griffith Jones and Wincokoe Creek within the Liber-  
ties of the City of Philadelphia, containing about one hundred Acres,  
which being inconvenient for all other Plantations & Settlem<sup>ts</sup> the sd.  
Griffith requests for a Valuable Consideration to be annexed to his.  
These therefore are to require thee forthwith to Survey or cause  
to be Survey'd to the said Griffith Jones the sd narrow strip of  
Land bounded as above sd. and make Returns thereof into my  
Secretaries Office, Given under my hand and Seal at Phi-  
lad<sup>ia</sup> the 6<sup>th</sup> day of 8<sup>ber</sup> 1701.
