

Survey'd unto Nicholas Wain the 10th of the 2^d month 1703 five hundred and twenty acres of land in the Liberties of the City Philadelphia beginning a stake in the free Societies Land Thence by the said line North west by west one hundred and twelve perches to a post Thence by Griffith Jones his land west south west one hundred and sixty perches to a post Then by the said Jones's land north, North west seventy four perches to a post Then west south west thirty nine perches to a Tree Then by the said Griffith Jones's Land south eighty eight degrees west one hundred and thirty seven perches then south south east sixty two perches Then west south west sixty four perches to a post Then north north west one hundred and fourteen perches Thence west south west sixty nine perches. Then by John Mitcheners land south south east Eighty five perches Then by the said Mitcheners land west south west one hundred & eleven perches to a post Then south, south ^{est} fifty four perches to a post Then North Sixty degrees east forty perches South sixty five degrees East forty four perches South Eighty four degrees east ~~thirty~~ ~~thirty~~ ~~per~~ Eighty four perches North sixty degrees east twenty eight perches south eighty four degrees east twenty seven perches South thirty four degrees east thirty perches to a white oak Then East twenty two perches to a Spanish Oak Then East northeast seventy four perches to a Hickery Tree Then South south east Thirty three perches to a post Then by Neals Laysson's land East north east fifty perches to a Creek Then by then by the Creek one perch to a post Then North, North west twelve perches Then East north east two hundred and forty six perches to the beginning.
