Whereas the Members of ye free Society of Traders in Pensilvania having purchased Twenty Thousand Acres of Land in this Province Our late Proprietary & Govern^r William Penn Esq^c granted them his Warrant dated the Twenty Sixth day of the twelfth Month 1682 directed to ye then Survey^r-Gen^l requiring him to Cause ye same to be Survey'd or laid out to the sd Society. By Virtue whereof some part of the sd Land was survey'd and ye residue remains unlocated. And Whereas by an act of Gen^l Assembly of this Province all the sd Lands with the Appurtenances are vested & Settled in us as Trustees with Power to sell ye land for ye use of ye sd Society and we having sold to David Lloyd Esq^c One thousand ^{Directions of the} Acres of ye sd unlocated Land and in pursuance of the sd Act of Assembly have settled and adjusted in ye Survey^r Generals office of this Province the True Acc^t of the Lands already Survey'd & laid out in Right of the sd Society and Secured the payment of ye Arrears of Quittrents due for the same to ye Proprietor of this Province. These are therefore to request thee in pursuance of the aforesaid Original Warrant of ye sd late Proprietary and by ye Authority of the sd Act of Gen^l Assembly to survey or cause to be survey'd unto the said David Lloyd -- according to the Established & Usual Method heretofore practised for taking up of Lands in this Province and not otherwise the sd quantity of one Thousand -- -- -- Acres and make return thereof into ye sd Survey^r-Generals Office - Given under our hands and Seals at Philadelphia the Twenty fifth -- Day of March anno Domini 1724
