

Pennsylvania ss.

By the Proprietaries

Whereas by Warrant under the Hand and seal of our late Father dated the first day of September 1700, Edward Pennington, then Surveyor General of this Province and Territories thereunto belonging, was required and commanded (in pursuance of the primitive Regulations for laying out lands in this Province) to Survey or cause to be surveyed to the proper use and Behoof of our said Father and his Heirs, Five hundred acres in every Township consisting of Five Thousand acres that should be surveyed, and generally one Tenth part of all the lands that should be laid out in this Province or Territories. These are to authorize and require you to make strict examination what has been done in pursuance of the above mentioned warrants, and make exact returns of such surveys into the Secretary's office; As also of all other lands whatsoever that have, by Warrants hereto fore issued, been appropriated to our Use. Witness George Thomas Esquire Lieutenant Governor of the said Province who in pursuance and by vertue of certain Powers and authorities to him for this purpose (Inter Alia) Granted by the said Proprietaries, hath hereunto set his Hand and caused the seal of the land office to be affixed at Philadelphia this Fourteenth day of November Anno Domini 1741.
