

At the Request of Philip Howell That we would grant him to take up sundry Rights of Headland belonging to Serv^{ts} who came in at the first Settling of this Province purchased by him of the said Serv^{ts} to witt fifty Acres in right of ~~Philip Edwards who came Servt to~~
~~Philip Edwards or~~ Edw^d mth Veagh who came in Servant to Tho: Holme fifty Acres in right of Alice mth Veagh Serv^t to James Harrison and two hundred Acres in right of Abraham Pratt, his Wife Jane Pratt & their two sons Thomas Pratt and John Pratt each fifty Acres who came all Servants to the Society of Traders being in all three hundred Acres under the Yearly quittrent of one half penny Sterl P^t Ace These are to Authorize and Require thee to Survey to the said Philip Howell according to the method of Townships appointed the said quantity of three hundred Acres of Land in this Province not already Survey'd nor taken up nor is conceal'd nor Seated by the Indians and make Returns into the Gen^l Surveyors Office where this Warr^t is to remain & a Copy thereof to be delvd to thee certified by the Secretary Given under our hands & by Seal of the Province
at Philad^{ia} 20th 10th Moth 1703.
