

PURSUANT to a warrant under the hands of the commissioners of Property and the seal of the Province bearing date the 22^d day of the 10th month 1701 granting unto Edward Rees a Resurvey on two hundred and five acres and a quarter of land seituate in Meirion Township in the County of Philadelphia the said Edwards possession 80 acres and a quarter thereof laid out in right of John Thomas and Edward Jones and the residue in right of Charles Loyd and Margaret Davies original purchasers.

There is resurvey'd unto Edward ^{Rees} a tract of land in Meirion Township in the County of Philadelphia beginning at a chestnut tree at the corner of Edward Jones his land from thence extending by the said Jones's land north seventy two degrees easterly one hundred fifty-eight perches to a corner from thence north fourteen degrees westerly by the said Edward Jones his land thirty perches. Then by the same land north seventy-two degrees easterly seventy-six perches to a corner stake from thence north fourteen degrees westerly thirty-two perches to a second stake from thence by Robert Roberts his land south seventy-seven degrees westerly two hundred thirty two perches to a third stake from thence north sixteen degrees west fifteen perches and a half to a corner marked chestnut tree from thence by Robert Owen's land west south west two hundred twenty-six perches to a stake on Evan Harry's line then south south-east by the said line eighty-six perches to ~~the~~ another stake from thence north seventy eight degrees easterly by William Cureton's land two hundred and ten perches. Then north 16 degrees west thirty perches to the place of beginning containing Two hundred and forty acres. Resurvey'd by David Powel the 7th of the 7th month 1702.
