By the Commissioners of Property.



Whereas the Proprietors former Commissioners Impowered to grant Lotts and lands by their warrant bearing date the 24th day of the 7th month 1684 granted unto Thomas Bond Original Purchaser of one thousand acres of land in this Province to take up his Lotts in the City and land in the Liberties proportionable to his said purchase. Pursuant to which Warrant his said proportion in the Liberties was survey'd at that time, but his front Lott in the City falling on the second twenty foot above Chesnut Street was by some ~~indirect means~~ ^{mistake} survey'd and granted to another persons so that y^e s^d Thomas Bond and his Heirs have been wholly disappointed thereof and have not hitherto rec'd any satisfaction for the same. At the request therefore of Charles Read and Anne his wife sole heiress to the said Thomas Bond that we would now grant them some compensation for their disappointment in y^e said Lott These are to authorize and require thee to survey or cause to be survey'd to the said Charles and Anne Read two whole vacant Lotts in the back streets of the said City viz. beyond y^e sixth street from Delaware where no appropriation has been made to any other person to be held under the yearly Quitrent of one English Shilling for each Lott forever and make a return thereof into the secretaries office Given under our hands and seal

of the Province at Philadelphia the 29th day of October in y^e year 1716. Richard Hill.
