Whereas the Proprietarys Commiss^{rs} have applyed themselves to me with complaint of great destruction of wood and timber that has been made upon the Proprietarys land in and about the Town of Philadelphia and have requested me that I would countenance the Proprietors officers in the execution of their offices and preservation of the Proprietors just int^{er}est and espeacially to grant unto Evan Oliver a warr^t of ~~the~~ assistance for all Justices of the Peace Constables &c to be aiding and assisting if need be to the said Evan Oliver in the Seising all such wood and timber as shall be found cutt upon the Proprietors land without leave.

I doe therefore by virtue of the authority derived unto me from his Excellency Benjamin Fletcher our Chief Govern^r &c. will and require you and every of you to be aiding & assisting unto the above mentioned Evan Oliver (or others who shall be appointed by the said Commiss^{rs} for the Proprietors service) in the seising all such wood and timber as aforesaid for the use aforesaid and the said Evan Oliver & others who shall be appointed as aforesaid are hereby authorized and impowered to seise the same for the use aforesaid, and all Carters whatsoever are hereby charged and required not to Cart any wood or timber from off the Proprietors land without leave first had from the Proprietary Commissioners as they will answer the contrary at their perill. Given under my hand & seal the tenth day of January in the fifth year of the Reigne of William & Mary of England &c King & Queen Anno g^o Dom. 169³/₄.

To all Justices of the Peace Constables & other their Majesties Loving Subjects in Philadelphia.
