



A Draught of a Tract of land part whereof in Manchester & part thereof in Dover Townships in the County of York Resurveyed the 30<sup>th</sup> day of November agreeable to the lines formerly Run in Pursuance of Three Warrants now the Property of George Ilgenfreitz Containing in the Whole Three Hundred and Fifty six acres & Three Eighths and the allowance of Six acres per Cent for Roads &c.

Dated the 5<sup>th</sup> day of July 1750.  
The Piece Marked with the Letter A Contains fifty five acres Warrant in the name of Valentine Ertle It being part of a Survey made and Returned in the Name of Thomas Wilson. The Piece Marked with the Letter B Contains Ninety five acres and one Eighth Warrant in the name of Stephen Gruell Dated the 20<sup>th</sup> day of September 1739. The Piece Marked with the letter C Contains Two Hundred and Six acres and Two Eighths Warrant in the name of George Ilgenfreitz Dated the 12<sup>th</sup> day of April 1768. N.B. When the Warrant in his Own name was granted it was supposed that the land was in the Manor of Springettsbury but no Examination is found to be at least Two Miles North of the Manors line.

Before I would Survey George Ilgenfreitz's Land I sent for him and the Present Owner of the Residue of Wilson's Tract (which is marked with the letter W) and they both consented to the line which runs through Wilson's from the White Oak to the Hickory My Principle Reason for taking this step was the Order of the Board in my hand Dated the 13<sup>th</sup> April 1762 Begun by the late Mr. Charles Lister but not finished by him he Run the line as it now stands but did not begin at the W.C. Marked in the said Order now finished by Michael C. of the Parties as it stands stated in the annexed plot
