



The black Lines represent the Survey I made for Mr. Garrison in right of Stephen Woolley agreeable to his Claim. The Courses East 58 1/2 to a pine South 63 to a pine & S 80° E 80 p to a pine. I found to have been run agreeable to William Parsons's field Works of a Survey unfinished the rest of my Survey for Mr. Garrison was along Ed. Lines not to be found in Mr. Parsons's Notes - The yellow lines show the Survey made for Isaiah Jennings by John Scullin Nov<sup>r</sup> 17 65 and how Mr. Garrison's Survey interferes - but it appears from Jennings's Draught, as if the chief part of the Survey I made for Mr. Garrison lies within the lines of a Survey made for Samuel Flower
