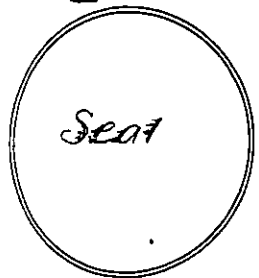

William Penn Absolute Proprietary and Govern^r in Chief
of the Province of Pensilvania and Counties Annexed

At the Request of Tobias Dymocke That I would grant him to take
up Two hundred and fifty Acres of Land in right of Nathan
Hardin first Purchaser of five hundred Acres whose Widow the
S^d Tobias Married, These are to require thee forthwith to Survey or Cause
to be Surveyed to the S^d Tobias Dymocke and his Wife Sarah the Said
Number of two hundred ^{& fifty} Acres of Land in full of the S^d Purchase
where it has not been already Surveyd nor taken up nor is concealed
nor Seated by Indians to be laid out according to the Method of
Townships by me appointed, Which Survey being duly made and
returned shall if Seated within Six Months after y^e same is made
be confirmed to them their Heirs and Assigns as an Estate of
Inheritance for ever. Given under my Hand and Seal at Philadelphia
the 27th of ye 12th moth 1709
