

Philadelphia, July 29.<sup>th</sup> 1794.

Dear Sir,

I have examined the Act passed the 21.<sup>st</sup> March 1785, referred to in your favor of the 18 instant, and I have also read the report of the Land Officers on the subject.

I take it as a conceded circumstance, that those Officers and Soldiers whose Tickets have been drawn can suffer no possible injury from putting into the wheel at this time the Tickets that were omitted, and that the chance of those, whose Tickets were in the Wheel, would not have been better, had the omitted Tickets been drawn with theirs, than if drawn separately.

Proceeding on this Idea, I conceive that the Governor can, at this time, lawfully put the deficient Tickets into the Wheel, and direct the same to be drawn, in favor of the unsatisfied Claims.
