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NOTE A.—The light dotted perpendicular lines, which divide the spaces intended for numbers on this Schedule, are intended to separate the units, tens, &c., from each other, and the Enumerator should be careful that the figures are written within the small spaces so formed, thus: 7 4 1, the units 4 2 1, the tens 7 4 1, the units 3 9 1, the units in the right-hand small spaces.  
NOTE B.—Make an affirmative entry by a slanting line (thus /) in one of the three columns 2, 3, and 4, according as the fact is in the case of each farm—in column 2, if the occupier is the owner of the farm; in column 3, if he is the tenant at a fixed money rental; in column 4, if he conducts it for a share of the product.  
NOTE C.—Enumerators will observe that there are 100 questions relating to each farm, which are arranged in four successive divisions of each schedule page.

Main table section: THE PERSON WHO CONDUCTS THIS FARM, ACRES OF LAND, FARM VALUES, FENCES, LABOR, GRASS LANDS.

Table section: NEAT CATTLE AND THEIR PRODUCTS, MOVEMENT, 1879.

Table section: CEREALS, PULSE, FIBER, SUGAR, BROOM CORN.

In relation to the crop, I desire to say that the crop of 1879 throughout this vicinity was very light, far below the average, owing to late spring and early autumn frosts, and some crops were entire failure.

The crop of 1880 averaged nearly 57 shelled corn per acre, and also the crop of the present year promises a heavy yield.
