

# Foreign Style Chicken Gains in Popularity

CHICAGO (UPI) — Scalloped corn chips and tezazini are in.

Southern fried is out in the wash.

Drumsticks are in.

A survey by the Market Research Corp. of America reported Wednesday at the newspaper food editors' conference that chicken has become the nation's favorite food.

It's not because it's served up fancy, foreign style.

The survey, sponsored by the T. French Co., Rochester, N.Y., included 4,000 families. Studied were eating habits over a year.

It found that boneless steak was runner-up to chicken in preference on the nation's dining tables, indicating that price had little to do with popularity.

The surveyors felt their findings reflected two trends in Americans' dining habits: a movement away from high-fat, high cholesterol foods, and a growing taste for gourmet cooking, for which chicken is adaptable.

Popularity of southern fried

and roast stuffed chicken was di-

minished, while chicken was an in-

creasing taste for home-cooked

gourmet-style chicken dishes of French and Italian origin.

## West Chester College Fires President Stern

Dr. Stern had said earlier in the day he had received an "ultimatum" to resign or be fired from his position.

Before taking the college post last year, Stern was director of the Division of Research and Statistics in the State Department of Revenue.

**Citizens Urged**

To Get Flu Shots

HARRISBURG (UPI) — State

Health Secretary Charles L. Wilbur today urged Pennsylvania's so-called "high risk" residents to get flu shots to protect against influenza in advance of the late fall and early winter season.

Wilbur's recommendation was issued to persons with heart disease, respiratory diseases, diabetes, and other chronic illnesses, persons over 65 and pregnant women.

He warned that if we strike

a community it is too late to protect those people.

However, Wilbur said that per-

sons who eat eggs or chicken because of food allergies should not be given the flu vaccine which is produced in

eggs.

AN ORDINANCE No. 1, 1981

An Ordinance of the Township of Shenango, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, providing for the subdivision of land within the boundaries of the said township:

AND IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED

AND ENACTED, That pursuant to the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, of May 1, 1933, as amended:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE AND AUTHORITY.

For the purpose of subdividing land suitable for building purposes and for the harmonious development of Shenango Township, County of Lawrence, Pennsylvania, for the coordination of existing and future zoning regulations, and other features of the official plan, for providing adequate open space, for protecting soil and air, and for proper distribution of the road and sidewalks; a preliminary plan of proposed sanitary sewer systems, and grades and sizes indicated.

SECTION 2. COVERAGE.

Whereby the subdivider shall be required to conform to the following:

SECTION 3. PLAT.

When required by the Planning Commission, the final plat shall be submitted by the subdivider to the Planning Commission for final approval.

SECTION 4. APPROVAL.

Upon final plat approval by the Planning Commission, the subdivider shall be required to record the same in the office of the Register of Deeds.

SECTION 5. EASEMENTS.

Whereby the subdivider shall be required to record the following:

SECTION 6. RECORDING.

Subdivisions shall be recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds.
