

Letter to Washington Ct <sup>June 10</sup> 1834

Mr Crane Dear Sir I take up my pen to inform you that I am well and hope at the arrival of these few lines you may be found in the same state of health — Since I had intended to visit you shortly but as it were I cannot I had been as you are I happened on last week and was taken very ill and in a few days afterwards I returned to this place and am not as well as I should wish for I left my Mother a few weeks ago for business and had been informed to do this business immediately but as it were — I thought proper to write a few lines to you informing you to do my business as soon as possible and let me know when I can visit you and get the deed and I shall then satisfy you from your trouble I By so doing you will very much oblige your friend I will wish —

I shall enclose the papers necessary to be made to me immediately and state when I can come —
