William Penn Proprietary and Govern<sup>r</sup> of the Province of Pennsylvania and Counties Annexed.

At the request of Robert Assheton That I would grant him to take up fifteen hundred acres of land in right of himself and his sister Mary being one moiety of three thousand acres granted by me to their father William Assheton for the use of his four Children. These are to require three fourths to survey or cause to be survey'd to the s<sup>d</sup> Robert Assheton (to whom he said sister Mary has resigned her right) the said number of acres of land in this Province not already survey'd nor tak<sup>(obl)</sup> up nor concealed nor seated by the Indians to be laid out according to the method of townships by me appointed. And make returns thereof into my Secretaries office. Given und<sup>(obl)</sup> my hand and seal in the Bay of Delaware the first day of <sup>6<sup>th</sup></sup> 9 1701.
