In pursuance of a Warrant from the Proprietary Comiss<sup>rs</sup> dated the first day of December 1726. I surveyed the Jacob L. Lemore a certain tract or parcel of Land Situate on a branch of Paxton Creek in the County of Lancaster. Beginning at a Black Oak on the North side of the said Branch. Hence crossing the same South 230 pches by Vacant Land to a Hickory, thence E by S. by Vacant Land 200 pches to a Black Oak. Hence North by Vacant Land 8 pches to a post. thence N. E. by N. by Vacant Land 161 pches to a Black Oak. Thence N. W. by W. by Vacant Land 162 pches to a chestnut Oak, thence West by Vacant Land 66 pches to a White Oak. Hence W. S. W. by Vacant Land 41 pches to the place of Beginning. Containing 375 acres land and the other 200-  
and of six acres of Creek. Survey'd the 14<sup>th</sup> day of June 1730.
