



By virtue of a Warrt from the Proprietaries Comr<sup>ee</sup> to me directed bearing date the 14<sup>th</sup> Jun<sup>t</sup> 1703 to lay out unto Henry Child (original purchase of 1000 acres) the quantity of five hundred acres in the County of Bucks. Surveyed and laid out unto the s<sup>d</sup> Henry Child a tract of Land in Plumstead township in the s<sup>d</sup> County Beginning at a Post at a corner of Midos Musgrave's land. Thence North West by a Road three hundred twenty five perches and one quarter of a perch to a Post. Then by other land of the s<sup>d</sup> Henry Child North East two hundred forty six perches to a Post. Then South East by Francis Plumsted's land 325 1/4 perches to a Post by a White oak in the s<sup>d</sup> Musgrave's line. Then by the s<sup>d</sup> line South West 246 perches to the place of Beginning. Containing five hundred acres.

By virtue of another Warrt from the s<sup>d</sup> Comr<sup>ee</sup> to me directed bearing date the 15 Jun<sup>t</sup> 1703 to lay out unto the s<sup>d</sup> Henry Child 484 1/4 acres the remainder of his purchase of One thousand acres. Surveyed and laid out unto the s<sup>d</sup> Henry Child a tract of Land in \_\_\_\_\_ Township in the s<sup>d</sup> County Beginning a Post at the corner of his other tract. Thence North West by a Road three hundred and fourteen perches and three quarters of a perch to a Black oak. Thence North East by Vacant Land two hundred forty six perches to a Post. Then by Francis Plumsted's land South East 314 1/4 perches to a Post. Then by his other tract South West 246 perches to the beginning. Containing four hundred eighty four acres. Laid out both the s<sup>d</sup> tracts the ninth day of the febrill, month 17011
