To John Taylor Esq. Surveyor General
for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Whereas in and by a certain Warrant of Survey (No. 287) dated at Philadelphia the 26th day of August, A. D. 1783, directed by his Excellency John Dickinson, Esquire President of the Supreme Executive Council of the said Commonwealth to John Lukens, Esquire Surveyor General and remaining on file in the Surveyor General's Office, it is shown that Jacob Shalles of the City of Philadelphia had by his petition to the Supreme Executive Council set forth that he was entitled to a Lot of Ground on the Schuylkill side of the said City, in right of Thomas Dell's original purchase of Five Hundred Acres, and as the Ground which fell by allotment to the said Dell was formerly granted and surveyed to William Sulaway in right of his original purchase, the said Shalles (said) requested that a Lot of Ground might be laid out for him on the East side of Schuylkill Second Street, and on the North side of Locust Street of the length and depth proportionable to the purchase aforesaid. Wherefore the said Surveyor General was by the said Warrant authorized and required to survey and lay out unto the said Jacob Shalles the said Lot of Ground at the place aforesaid, and to make return thereof unto the Office of the Secretary of the Land Office, in order for Confirmation by Patent to the said Jacob Shalles.

A Copy of which original Warrant, certified under the Seal of the Surveyor General's Office at Harrisburg, the 19th day of August, 1831, by Jacob Spangler, Esq. (then) Surveyor General, having been presented to me, I thereupon, at the instance and request of N. Nixon, Esq. of Philadelphia, proceeded forthwith to make a Survey of the above mentioned Lot of Ground, and found the bearings and distances of the several boundary lines thereof to be as the same are represented in the enclosed Draft, and as follows to wit: Beginning at the North East corner of said Schuylkill Second Street and Locust Street in the City of Philadelphia aforesaid, thence extending along the Eastern side of said Locust Street North Thirteen Degrees East Sixty Feet to a corner of Vacant Ground, thence by the said Vacant Ground South Seventy seven Degrees East Two Hundred and Forty seven Feet, Six inches to Ground granted to John Donaldson, thence by the said Donaldson's Ground South Thirteen Degrees West Sixty Feet to Locust Street aforesaid, thence along the North side of said Locust Street Two Hundred and Forty seven Feet and Six Inches to the place of Beginning - Containing Fifty four square Perches and Fifty four one hundredth parts of a perch. (Being a Lot of Ground from which Clay has been dug and now lies wholly unimproved.) The following is a correct Draft thereof.
