



In pursuance of a Warrt of Resurvey granted to the Revd Mr. Smith, Dr<sup>r</sup> J<sup>r</sup> Redman, Capt. Nathaniel Falconer & J<sup>r</sup> Palmer, bearing date the 3<sup>d</sup> day of April 1773 for the Resurveying of the Liberty Land appertenant to the Original purchase of Capt. Wm Markham and J<sup>r</sup> Tizzack, lately in the possession of Wm Palmer the Elder. These may Certifie that I did on the 5<sup>d</sup> of the same Month Resurvey the said Tract according to its ancient Meas & Bounds and found it to Contain 140<sup>acres</sup>: 123 p. Containing within the said bounds the quantity of twenty nine Acres of Overplus And at the same time I did Survey the part or Share of said large Tract now claimed & in possession of Captain Falconer & found it to contain 71<sup>acres</sup>: 113 p. which is included fifteen Acres of said Overplus. And the said Falconer having two Liberty Rights one of Eight Acres appertenant to the Original purchase of 500<sup>acres</sup> made by Tho<sup>r</sup> Zachary as by W<sup>t</sup> dated the 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> Mo. 1721 granted to James Steel for the same may appear the other for Eight Acres appertenant to the Orig<sup>c</sup> purchase of 500<sup>acres</sup> made by Joseph Richards as by Warrt granted to Wm Palmer dated the 16<sup>th</sup> March 1733/4 will appear, which Rights are now vested in the said Falconer & he requested I would lay the same on the overplus contained within his s<sup>c</sup> 71<sup>acres</sup>: 113 p. These may Certifie that I have laid the said two Warrts for Liberty Land on the said Overplus as included in the said 71<sup>acres</sup>: 113 p. of Land Returned into the Secretarys Office the 13<sup>th</sup> of July last for said Falconer.
