Situate on both sides of the North fork of Turkeyfoot in Turkeyfoot Township Somerset County and Surveyed the 12th day of May 1809 in pursuance of Two warrants one granted to Jas McNeal for 100 acres the other to Neal McNeal for 190^{1/2} and both warrants dated respectively the 3rd day of March 1798 Containing in both surveys 293^{1/2} acres and allowance when the fractional parts are added together.

Note the circumstances attending the above Two surveys are thus. the said James McNeal and Neal McNeal were Brothers and both deceased shortly after obtaining these Warrants and the said James McNeal being the real owner of the whole Land died previous to obtaining a conveyance from his Brother of the part warranted in his name, the said James McNeal to my knowledge purchased the whole land from a certain James Love and I think him and his Heirs has paid the full purchase of the Land to Mr Love. James McNeal merely making use of his Brothers name in obtaining the warrant, the orphan family of James McNeal deceased request that the Honorable Board will permit a patent to issue for the whole Land to Loughlin McNeal Administrator of the Estate of Jas McNeal deceased in order to save a poor and industrious family the expense of another Patent. James Hanna Esq representative from our County has I presume the necessary papers. I send this general plan of the Land in order that Patent may the more conveniently issue for the whole land if consistent with the rules of Office. If otherwise I send separate returns also in order that the Honorable the Board of Property may grant Patent as they think proper
