C^t E^s situate in Red bank township Armstrong county adjoining lands of Thomas Smullin; Collin M^c Nut, George Burns and heirs of Samuel Craig on the West, lands surveyed to Co! And^w Porter and land surveyed to Jo^s Thomas Esq: on the East and North ~~~ The part of Henry Sawyers contains two hundred and ten acres one hundred and ten perches and all. — that of John Burns contains one hundred and seventy four acres, sixty one perches and the same allowance of six pt. C^t.

The land described by the Warrant would have included the Remaining part of N^o 5600 of Jo^s Thomas, but that land being previously appropriated and a patent issued for the same, Charles Sawyers sold his right and interest in the before recited warrant to John Burns for the consideration of the Money thereon paid on the part of Charles Sawyers, which act was confirmed by a written Agreement bearing the same date as that of the present survey -- Upon these principles with the mutual consent of all parties concerned or in any wise interested -- 3d Warrant hath been located as represented in ^{the} proceeding Diagram whereof the land represented as the part of John Burns is actually a remaining part of the same survey of which Henry Sawyers was the principal and only Actual settler and improver of the land, and signed the before recited contract.
